About four years ago, Dirck and Chona Curry moved to Owensboro and registered at St. Stephen Cathedral. Along with their grown daughter Noelle, Dirck's parents Kenneth and Virginia Curry joined them in Owensboro. Noelle, their daughter, worked with the church's Youth Group prior to making a career change last fall. The Currys also have two sons, Justin and Jason.

When they came to Owensboro, Dirck was already an ordained Catholic deacon, and since his arrival, Dirck has become involved with an assortment of Cathedral ministries including serving on the RCIA team and serving on the altar in different capacities in the sanctuary. He can read the Gospel, deliver homilies, preside at funerals, and administer the Sacaments of Baptism and Marriage. His wonderful wife Chona is equally involved with various church-related activities; with a smile on her face, she's always ready to say "yes" when asked to help in any way she can. She has the reputation of being a very fine cook. One has only to look at one of her pizzas or to sample one of her soups or homemade breads to know Chona is gifted in culinary art. She and Dirck enjoy being in the kitchen together; making lasagna and various soups are but two of their specialties.

In addition to cooking together, after 32 years of marriage, the Currys enjoy gardening, prayer-walks, attending concerts, dancing, and traveling to countries on mission assignments. Attending daily Mass is a priority of the Currys.

Along with being an active deacon at St. Stephen, Dirck practices osteopathic medicine at Owensboro's McCauley Care Center; many of his patients are uninsured or underinsured. When asked what he likes about his ministry at St. Stephen, he commented that parishioners are friendly and supportive. Last fall, when accepting the challenge of coordinating the Parish Fall Festival, he appreciated the fact that so many parishioners stepped up to the plate and volunteered to help with the many jobs that needed to be done.

When asked to comment, Fr. Jerry Riney remarked without hesitation, "Deacon Dirck and Chona are tremendous assets to St. Stephen Cathedral. They truly live out what the diaconate is all about---serving selflessly in the name of the Lord. No one could put a price tag on Deacon Dirck's service to the poor through the McCauley Clinic and beyond. Much of what the Currys do is "behind the scenes, done joyfully and without a lot of fanfare."

Christmas - the Work Begins

Puccini, the famed composer, contracted cancer at an early age. He chose to spend his last days composing his final opera, Turandot. When friends urged him to rest he retorted, "I'm going to do as much as I can on my great masterpiece. Then it's up to you, my friends, to finish it if I don't." His friends forever mourned his death, but built upon his melody and completed what Puccini started.

When Turandot was played for the first time in 1926, the conductor, the legendary Toscanini, paused and with a smile announced, "This is where the master ends." After a brief but profound silence he added, "And this is where his friends begin," continuing the opera to its end.

The season of Christmas commenced with decorations, carols, gift giving, and packed churches. The day after Christmas, the very next day, we celebrated the feast of St. Stephen, our patron, who died for his faith. The message is clear. There is no nostalgia in being put to death for what one believes. If Jesus is truly born into our lives, we will pay a price.

Almost immediately we celebrated the Feast of the Holy Family. Like Mary and Joseph we are called to be holy, to accept God's grace individually and communally. And on the second Sunday after Christmas we hear of the Magi who followed the star of faith to the presence of the Christ Child and offered Him gifts of gold (kingship), frankincense (divinity) and myrrh (humanity). These wise "seekers," educated in medicine, natural science, and cosmology, represent "difference"—in culture, traditions, and in ways of living. Truly God wanted the whole world to know Jesus.

Finally, the Christmas season is crowned with the feast of the Baptism of Jesus. We are called into His life through the Sacrament of Baptism, becoming part of a community of faith where we live our lives as witnesses to His kingdom, His values, His way. We are called to continue the mission which Jesus began, to become, not a band, not a fan club, nor mere spectators, but to become the true followers which He sought.

Christmas has called us to revel in the mystery of the Incarnation, God literally "pitching His tent among us" (John 1), to accept Jesus as Messiah, Savior, and Lord, and to begin the hard work of conversion. To do less would be to relegate Christmas to a pagan winter festival. Like the friends who committed themselves to finishing Puccini's masterpiece, so are we, the friends and disciples of Jesus Christ, called to take up the work of His mission.

When the song of the Angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and the princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with their flocks,

The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost,

To heal the broken,

To feed the hungry,

To release the prisoner,

To rebuild the nations,

To bring peace among the people,

To make music in the heart.
