"Where Play is Our Work"

Thirty years ago, Fr. Ed Bradley and Mrs. Dee Dee Baur took a huge step in faith which led to the opening of Cathedral Preschool. Initially, it was intended to encourage young families to become members of St. Stephen Catholic parish, but throughout the years, the preschool served families of all faith traditions as a pillar in our community.

The school began with a small staff teaching only 4-year olds. Today, it has expanded to include 3, 4, and 5-year old students with a dedicated staff of eleven and students numbering over 100.

Larry Lyon, who headed this project, was on staff at St. Stephen Cathedral about 30 years ago working for 26 years before retiring. He did not "officially retire" because he remains devoted in supporting the preschool in various ways. Larry became invaluable when any need arose.

Recently, it became necessary to replace the playground equipment which was installed in 1987. A combination of various fundraising events and generous grants fulfilled this need. The preschool received generous grants from The Michael E. Horn Family Foundation and The Catholic Foundation of Western Kentucky. Many more donations and support flooded in from St. Stephen parishioners and preschool families and friends. These gifts to our preschool made it possible to finance and install the playground.

Back to Our Roots

As a Church we have just experienced the Lent/Easter season; hopefully, we have experienced dying and rising, coming to grips with sin and destructive behaviors, yet rising to resurrection and the new life which the risen Lord calls us. We have also experienced two transitional feasts:

the feast of the Trinity, the community of the Father and the Son, giving birth to the Spirit; and the feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus (Corpus Christi), becoming community, becoming more and more Christ-like! Lots of things have changed but not the essence of Eucharist!

Did you know that in the year 350, the Council of Nicea outlawed the practice of kneeling, saying the preference was the older custom of standing during the Eucharist?

Did you know that Protestants originated the use of pews/ benches (first stone, then wood) and that Catholics used chairs in the early Church, as we still do today in St. Peter Basilica in Rome?

Did you know that tabernacles were not introduced in churches until the 12th century, and did not become standard until a few hundred years later?

Did you know that so few people were receiving Holy Communion in the 13th century that the pope made a law at the Fourth Lateran Council in 1215 saying that people must receive Communion at least once a year? This became

known as our "Easter duty." Shortly after this time, the veneration of the Blessed Sacrament at Benediction and the Corpus Christi procession became a substitute for receiving Holy Communion.

Did you know that the Mass changed from Greek to Latin under Pope Damasus, who died in 384, so that people could understand and participate better, and that was not changed again until 1963 for the same reason?

Did you know that laypeople had their roles at Mass slowly eliminated around the year 1000, and those roles were not restored until Council of Vatican II in 1962-65?

The Mass today is more like it was in the early years of the Church. The Eucharist has undergone many changes in its form, but its essence is still the same. We still gather to hear the Word; we still "take, bless, break and give" as St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians reports (Dom Gregory Dix, *The Shape of the Liturgy*). Baptized believers have gathered around the Word of God, and bread and wine having become the Body and Blood of Christ to be nourished, strengthened, energized, and transformed for 2000+ years.

Eucharist--what a gift! It is, indeed, Bread for the journey, strength for the living, an intimate meeting between a loving God and His adopted children. Eucharist is at the heart of what being a Catholic is all about!

Sing a New Song to the Lord

"Sing a new song to the Lord [...]/ Break into song; sing praise. / Sing praise to the Lord [...]" Psalm 98:1, 4-5

The Diocese of Owensboro was blessed to have Joe Simmons hold a cantor intensive workshop, "Vocal Performance to Vocal Prayer," on July 30, 2016, at the McRaith Catholic Center. Simmons is a nationally recognized music minister who serves as Principal Cantor at St. John the Baptist in New York City and travels across the United States presenting concerts of inspirational music and clinics for cantors and lectors.

July's cantor workshop combined key formation topics with skill-building experiences and was followed by coaching sessions. Cantors were engaged individually and given transformational techniques to better serve the assembly gathered during the Liturgy. Nine dedicated St. Stephen's cantors attended the workshop, and 15 participated in the coaching session. Here is what a few of those cantors had to say.

Doreen Harney stated:

I have served as a cantor in three parishes since the 1980s [...] Over the years, my choir directors have always stressed the importance of learning the music, pronouncing the words distinctly, and have given encouragement to overcome the fright of standing in the front of church and singing! But [...] Joe Simmons [...] presented a new and challenging perspective to the role of cantor. Mr. Simmons focused on the cantor's role as the proclaimer of the responsorial psalm in dialogue with the assembly. It is a comfort to know that I am not singing *for* the people as much as singing *with* the people. He gave us specific ways to help open this dialogue with the people by using eye contact, facial expressions, inviting gestures, and artistic expression.

Cindy Bornander said:

A big thank you to the Diocese for the very special gift I received from Joe. The cantor workshop helped me discover that my offering of music is truly a music ministry and not merely an obligation. There is so much more than just learning words and notes. Proclaiming the Psalm is delivering scripture to the assembly, and that is an awesome responsibility.

Harney agreed with Bornander saying, "What a glorious song to the Lord! I am grateful to Mike Bogdan, Director of the Office of Music, for making this workshop a reality for our Diocese. And thank you to James Wells, Director of Music at St. Stephen, for encouraging me and many of our other cantors to share this learning experience."
