Rite of Acceptance

On January 19th, at the 9:00 AM Mass, we celebrated The Rite of Acceptance and Welcome with 21 people wishing to become full members of our Catholic faith. This was the first "Rite" of the RCIA Journey of Faith and the first public ritual. In the Rite of Acceptance and Welcome, the Catechumens (those not baptized) and the Candidates (those already baptized in another faith tradition or as an infant in the Catholic Church) are officially welcomed by the Church as disciples, members (but not yet full members) of the household of faith. During the Rite, they are literally marked with the cross of Christ as God's own and as a sign of their new way of life and commitment to Jesus and our Catholic faith. Their sponsors sign them with the cross on the forehead, heart, hands, feet, and on parts signifying all the senses. Their sponsor then presents them with a cross around their neck. Please keep these 21 people in your prayers as they continue their Journey with Jesus, not only to Easter but throughout their lives until they hear Jesus say, "Well done good and faithful servant."


First Reconciliation

Come and Meet Jesus in the Paschal Triduum

As I pondered a topic for this article, I re-read a booklet called Glory in the Cross: A Journey through the Pascal Triduum, written by an acquaintance of mine, Corinna Laughlin. Corinna is the pastoral assistant for liturgy at St. James Cathedral in Seattle and a gifted writer. I was again so inspired by her words that I have decided to share an excerpt from the booklet. If you did not receive a copy last year, there are some available at the doors of church. I encourage everyone to read it and be inspired too!



To glory in the Cross is to glory in the dying and rising of Christ—the Paschal Mystery—which is the heart of all liturgical prayer. Every time we celebrate Mass, we celebrate the Paschal Mystery. When we honor Mary or the saints, what we are really celebrating is their sharing in the Paschal Mystery of Christ. In fact, whenever the Church comes together for prayer, we celebrate the Paschal Mystery. Why? Because, as St. Paul said, "you too must think of yourselves as [being] dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus" (Romans 6:11). The Paschal Mystery marks the life of every Christian. Christ's dying and rising reveal to us our true identity and our destiny. We are sharers in the Paschal Mystery. Christ is risen, and we will rise with him. The Church never tires of celebrating this amazing reality.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum, the Three Days, is a special time to focus on this central mystery of Christ. On the evening of Holy Thursday, we leave Lent behind and begin a new liturgical season, the Paschal Triduum. The word Triduum is from the Latin for "three days." Because the liturgical "day" begins the evening before, the "three days" stretch over four days, from Holy Thursday evening, through Good Friday and Holy Saturday, ending on the evening of Easter Sunday. This shortest of our liturgical seasons is also the most important. During these days the Church invites us to go deeper into the central mystery of our faith. The Triduum is really one great prayer the Church offers to God. Even though our only obligation is to participate in one of the Easter Masses (the

Easter Vigil or Easter Sunday Mass), to miss out on Holy Thursday or Good Friday is to deprive ourselves of something truly extraordinary. The liturgy of these holy days immerses us in words, sights, and sounds that shape and inspire our praying, our thinking, and our living.

Participating in the Triduum is not an intensive seminar or a time to learn about Jesus. This is an opportunity to meet Jesus. Like the woman who anointed the feet of Jesus a few days before he died, we are invited to pour out the treasure of our love, our prayer, and our time, in order to focus on Christ alone. We set aside other concerns and activities—some important, others not so important—in order to pray together with the Church and as the Church.

Questions for Discussion and Reflection

- Have you ever participated in all three days of the Triduum—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday? What memories remain with you from these liturgies?
- Do you have a cross in your home or around your neck? What does it mean to you?
- Do you sometimes find it hard to "glory in the cross?" Why?

My Journey of Faith

"Pain and suffering have come into your life; but remember pain, sorrow and suffering are but the kiss of Jesus; a sign that you have come so close to him that he can kiss you." - Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta

I am a wife, mother, daughter, sister, aunt, and godmother. I wear many titles just like so many others. My testimony begins with my first title, daughter. I was raised in a closeknit, Catholic home in Owensboro, Kentucky. My parents, Bill and Maire McCormick, instilled in my siblings and me the importance of Mass, the Eucharist, praying, confession, offering our discomforts to the souls in purgatory, and the Rosary. I have so many memories from my childhood that center around our Catholic faith: praying before meals while holding hands around the table; Mom blessing us each night with holy water after our nightly prayers; never missing Mass on Sunday; etc. It was ingrained in us at a young age to practice good morals and to pray to God for everything. My parents made many sacrifices, which included sending my siblings, Will, Bridget, and Veronica, and me to Catholic schools from preschool through high school. If it were not for the firm foundation that my parents laid for me throughout my childhood and teenage years, I may have stayed on the road that I stumbled on for a few years.

After graduating from high school, I went away to college; from that time to my late 20s, I struggled and felt lost. Mentally and verbally abusive relationships, partying, and alcohol were the culprits for so many dark years. I never forgot my faith, and my heart knew that our God would always welcome me back home. The desire to go to confession, ask for forgiveness, and turn my back on the sinful lifestyle I was living was there. The struggles I was enduring led to depression, self-doubt, and a feeling of unworthiness, especially unworthy of the purest love I have ever known. It was hard to pray or go to Mass without feeling like a hypocrite. These were lies from Satan trying to pull me further from the Church.



The devil preys on us in our weakest state. I felt a voice within begging me to overcome this deep valley. My soul needed to confide in the Lord. One evening, with the help of my older sister, Bridget, I met with a local Father of Mercy priest. He spoke to me with compassion and truth that calmed my worries and self-doubt. This moment was my turning point, and I will never forget that evening and the weight of years of hurt and sin that were lifted. My soul was awakened, and I was ready to be cleansed. I realized that no matter how hard life can get or how deep in sin we may fall, our God is forgiving and ready to lead us back to the path to heaven with Him. This is something I preached at many youth group meetings, retreats, and Catholic leadership conferences while in high school. It felt like coming home, believing in this again and living it.

Fast forward to my title as wife and mother. My goal is to ensure that my husband, son, and I all go to heaven. My husband, Jay, is currently in RCIA and will be baptized, make his First Communion, and be confirmed this Easter. God has used me as a vessel, opening his eyes to our beautiful faith and leading him towards a relationship with Christ and a prayer life that he did not know before. Watching my husband grow has further rooted my faith. He is now on fire with love for our Lord; and seeing his excitement build for receiving the sacraments is incredible to watch. Two people— my husband and I—have been brought back to Jesus.

"Trust in the Lord forever, for the Lord God is an everlasting rock." Isaiah 26:4

Growing up in Saint Stephen Cathedral, I was involved in our youth group and served as a lector and Eucharistic Minister. About a year ago, I decided that I wanted to get involved with the church again. I found my strengths again and wanted to share them. The Backpack Ministry to me was a no brainer. This parish group packs food and drinks for a group of kids on the weekends who may otherwise not have food. Knowing that this small task on my end makes a huge impact on these children made me want to do more. One of the most fulfilling ministries that I enjoy is our Jail Ministry. Once or twice a month, another Catholic volunteer and I visit with imprisoned women to share the Mass readings and break open the Word. We discuss their interpretations of the readings. I have never met a more creative and intelligent group of women. Their understanding of the Bible is incredible. I feel God's presence with me when I am there. These women would typically be looked down upon because, like I was, most of them are lost within a dark valley and feel like this is their place forever. I tell myself before I go into the jail that if I can open at least one person's heart to our Lord's love and forgiveness, then I did my job. There is a sense of relatability that I feel with them, which gives me a stronger drive to take their hand and show them there is hope.

These are the doors God has opened for me, doors that would not have opened if I had continued to believe the lies that the devil was working so hard to have me believe. The Mass and improving my prayer life have improved my quality of life. If you are reading this and are struggling in your spiritual life, my advice is simple: TRUST. Trust that God will never abandon you. Trust that His love is unceasing. Trust in His understanding and forgiveness. I encourage you to always believe that you are worthy of Him. By keeping God in the center of your life, your home, and your marriage, you will only grow closer to Him.

Parish Recognition and Blessing of those receiving Sacraments this year



"Happy Birthday to You!" —The most celebrated song in the world today. Birthdays are an occasion to reflect, give thanks, and celebrate the gift of LIFE! Birthright is a pro-life organization, offering a range of services designed to support and protect all life, especially that of the mother and child. The Birthright charter states, "It is the right of every pregnant woman to give birth, and the right of every child to be born." The agency is fully funded by donations and staffed by trained volunteers, serving over 4,500 women and babies annually in the Western Kentucky area. Birthright of Owensboro offers free and confidential pregnancy tests, referrals and guidance. Women are counseled about pregnancy, childbirth, adoption, prenatal care, parenting skills and childcare.

Birthright of Owensboro was founded in 1983 under the guidance of Most Reverend Bishop John McRaith. Birthright had already become important to Bishop McRaith during his ministry in Minnesota. Saint Pope John Paul II said, "The ultimate test of your greatness is the way you treat every human being, but especially the weakest and most defenseless ones." At the Birthright of Owensboro, there is a placard over the mantle that simply states: "Love is Spoken Here."


When I visited the Birthright home, I was reminded of a quote from Mother Teresa, "If you judge people, you have no time to love them." Director Terri LaHugh shines her light and love on many mothers through the Birthright ministry. She has been the Director of the Birthright of Owensboro for the past

20 years. She volunteers her time and talents, along with a staff of six volunteers. She describes the organization as giving help and purpose to women at a critical time in their life.

Terri says that many women need someone to talk to about their pregnancy as they may feel alone and frightened. Many are given referrals for pre-natal care, medical and financial assistance, continuing education, and legal and financial advice. Clients are served with compassion, care and commitment; help is ongoing and inclusive.

Additionally, Birthright assists mothers with diapers, formula, maternity clothes and clothing for baby and toddlers up to 6T. Baby blankets, layettes and other necessities are also provided upon the baby's birth. Much of the clothing is donated by local, Catholic families. Many of the new items and diapers are purchased with donations, mainly from the Baby Bottle Fund Drive or the Giving Tree at Christmas. No government funds are accepted; the Baby Bottle Fund Drive from local parishes in Daviess and Hancock counties provides Birthright with most operating funds. St. Stephen Cathedral parishioners donated \$2,810 in the most recent Baby Bottle fundraiser.

Birthright is located at 512 W. 7th St. and is open Monday through Thursday, 9 am to 12 pm, or by appointment. Volunteers are greatly needed. If you are interested in visiting Birthright, would like to volunteer your time or donate items, please call 270-926-7561.
